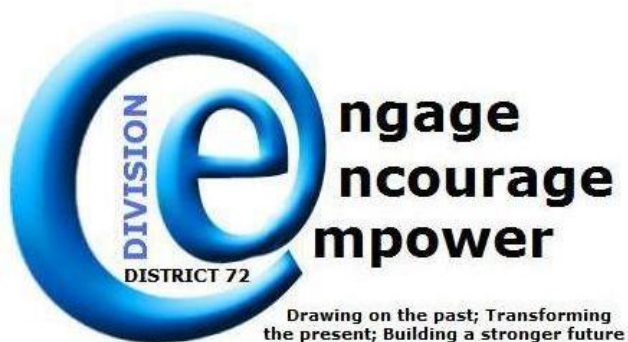

Something special took place in the coolest little Capital in July....



Kingi Biddle **Finalist in the World** **Championship of Public** **Speaking**

Kingi Biddle (pictured at left) won our Region's semi-final International Speech Contest in Las Vegas on Thursday night, and was a finalist in the World Championship of Public Speaking.

But before Kingi went to Las Vegas, Division E invited Kingi to come visit the coolest little capital where those who attended got the opportunity to:-

- feel engaged, empowered, and encouraged by listening to Kingi
- hear three educationals that were delivered by three experienced Toastmasters about:
 - how to organise fun and successful contests
 - how to judge contests
 - how to prepare for contests
- provide feedback to Kingi on his two speeches
- donate monies towards Kingi's trip to Las Vegas.

The afternoon kicked off with Elvis belting out background music of the 1964 hit "Viva Las Vegas". Then it was straight into three educationals that were delivered by Steve Preston (DTM), Lynn Bushell (CC), and Sanjiv Jetly (ACS, CL). Lynn has had a lot of speaking experience at the District level and Sanjiv was the 2008 District 72 International Prepared Speaker.

Then came the climax of listening to Kingi's two speeches. His first mesmerising speech was entitled "a simple greeting" and his second one was "two simple gifts". On both occasions the audience were encouraged to try their hand at judging both speeches.

Surprisingly, not many judging forms were filled out because the crowd were too engrossed in Kingi's speeches and as some would say later, they merely forgot about the judging forms as they were "simply captivated by the speaker in front of them".

But all was not lost because Kingi later received both verbal and written feedback which helped shape his final speeches in Las Vegas and which he was "totally blown away by"!

Following the speeches, an auction was then held to raise more money for Kingi's trip, culminating with a networking opportunity afterwards with Kingi and others over a cuppa.

Was the event successful in meeting the needs of the audience?

As a result over \$1,000 was raised on the actual day (incl the day's expenses).

What it means to finally become a Distinguished Toastmaster

The Toastmasters programme comprises of two tracks that you can progress along; either the leadership or communication tracks. As a newcomer to the programme you start off by working through the Competent Communicator manual in addition to the Competent Leader manual. As you develop there are a range of manuals and awards you can achieve which end in the ultimate achievement of attaining your Distinguished Toastmaster (DTM) award. Because Toastmasters is a self-paced programme, some Toastmasters can take several years to achieve this award while others can achieve it in several years.

If you are new to Toastmasters, the diagram opposite shows you how you can progress along both tracks to eventually achieve your DTM.

If you have been a Toastmaster for many years and are nearing completion of your DTM but have not seriously considered doing so, we hope this Maree's story inspires you to think about completing your DTM once and for all.

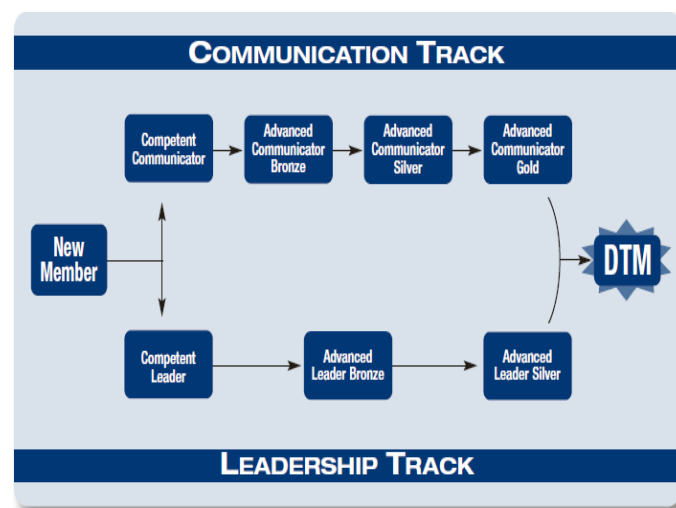
In your own words what does it mean to achieve the highest international award in Toastmasters which is the Distinguished Toastmaster Award? A bit overwhelming and really thrilled!!

Taking the fear out of judging contests



Two judging workshops were held recently where Toastmasters got the opportunity to learn the rules, responsibilities, and guidelines for judging Toastmasters contests.

If you were unable to get along to either of these workshops here are some brief 101-type

tips to give especially newcomers a flavour for what is required when considering becoming a speech contest judge for the very first time and for those of you who haven't judged for a while, here's some reminders of the role.

What is the purpose of judges for speech contests?

Judges play a critical role at contest time in that their sole purpose is to select a winner.

With 47 clubs in Division E, each contest that takes place requires at least five judges (if practicable otherwise three judges at club level is acceptable), one chief judge, one tiebreaking judge, at least three tally counters and two timekeepers. This means that numerous members are needed each year, in order to fulfill the judging role and determine winners that progress from club level to international level!

What material is recommended to read up on when looking to judge a contest?

- the latest speech contest rule book
- supporting contest material for the four contests (humorous, table topics, evaluation, international)
- the judging criteria and judging form layouts of each contest

What are the judge's codes of ethics?

- judges will consciously avoid bias of any kind in selecting first, second and third-place contestants. They will not consider any contestant's club, area, division, or district affiliation. Nor will they consider any contestant's age, sex, race, creed, national origin, professional or political beliefs. They will demonstrate the utmost objectivity
- judges will not time speeches and will not consider the possibility of under-time or over-
- time when judging a contestant speech

- judges will support by word and deed the contest rules and judging standards, refraining from public criticism of the contest and revealing scores and ranking only in accordance with official policy.

What are the requirements to be a judge?

To be a judge at a Toastmasters speech contest, you must meet all eligibility requirements identified below.

1. All judges shall be members in good standing;
2. All judges at area, division, district, semi-final, and International speech contests shall have been a Toastmasters member in good standing since July 1 of the previous year and have completed at least six *Competent Communication* manual projects.
3. All judges at the semi-final and International contests shall be at least an Advanced Toastmaster Bronze or Advanced Communicator Bronze and have previously judged a Toastmasters speech contest at area, division, district, or semi-final level.

Why get involved with judging?

It's a fun and challenging role because the evaluating and listening skills you've learned in your club can be put to great use in the judging arena. For example you get to help determine which contestant is the best to represent your club, area, division or district at the next level of the contest. By being a judge, you can make sure that your club, area, division, and district choose the best people for the job throughout the entire contest cycle – and you got to have a hand in it.

It fulfils CL Manual Requirements because being the chief judge for a club contest actually fulfils a project requirement in the *Competent Leadership* manual? Acting as a chief judge fulfills the "Help Organize a Club Speech Contest" project. Being involved doesn't just stop there – you also get rewarded for your effort here.

So think about it! Challenge yourself if you've never done this role before. Utilise your listening and evaluating skills and get involved in contributing to choosing a winner at future speech contests! Additionally, there are always mentors happy to help you in your local club, so ensure you ask your Committee or Division team!

Word of Mouth – Competent Leadership

But that's not all there is to know about Word of Mouth. Thanks to some of its members, it also provides you with the opportunity to obtain credits that focus on involvement in a club public relations campaign notably around:

- Project 6: Organisation and Delegation
- Project 8: Motivation
- Project 10: Team Building

Here are some recommendations regarding Project 6, **Organisation and Delegation**

“Leaders must ensure the team is organised enough to accomplish its goals and objectives, and provide a structure in which the team operates. Delegation plays a major role. A good leader performs functions that only he has the knowledge and authority to perform, delegating all other tasks to team members.”

The requirement is to *“Help organise a club public relations campaign”*. The evaluator looks at the following points¹:

1. The member ensures that required resources are available when needed (e.g. running sheet, any handouts, other members of the radio team).
2. Tasks were completed on time (i.e. other radio team members were given sufficient notice of their roles and the session itself was completed in the allocated time).

3. The member was organised.
4. The member collaborated successfully with others on the team.
5. The public relations campaign was successful.

In what way did the member’s organisational skills contribute to accomplishing objectives and goals? Did the member work well with others on the team and delegate tasks appropriately?

The member should attend sufficient recordings to be comfortable about speaking on the radio. The number of visits will depend on the member’s confidence level and the radio show team’s assessment of their readiness. When they are ready, they should be given a 10-15 minute session² to organise within a show.

The member should read the CL project to understand the motivation behind undertaking this PR campaign. They must identify a clear purpose for their session beforehand and it must involve promoting their club/s. They will work with at least one other member of the radio show team and effectively delegate some aspect of the session to that person. That person will complete the member’s CL manual.

On Saturday 20 August The Band Rotunda in Oriental Bay was the home to two workshops run by the Division E Toastmasters Leadership Institute Coordinators (TLI Trainers), Michelle Gerwitz and Michelle Selby (the M&Ms).

The first, starting at 9am and running through to 1pm, was a membership clinic which looked at a range of different aspects of how to build and retain membership within a club. This looked at why we need a focus on membership, what caused membership fluctuations, how to understand your clubs vision, mission and culture, how to build membership and how to retain members.

In the afternoon, from 2pm to 4:30pm, there was a judging clinic which looked at rules, responsibilities and important aspects when it comes to judging Toastmasters contests, whether that be at club, area, division or District level.

What is a Smedley Award?

1 August – 30 September

It all began in 1924. Ralph Smedley invited a few men to meet in the Santa Ana, California YMCA where he conducted the first meeting of what would eventually evolve into Toastmasters International. One person initiated a program that would go on to affect millions of people.

In his honour, you are encouraged to add five new, dual, or reinstated members between 1 August and 30 September. By doing so you'll qualify to receive a "Smedley Award" ribbon to display on your club's banner. Membership applications and payment for members who join between August 1 and September 30 must be received at World Headquarters or online no later than 30 September. Each member's joining date as listed on the application must be no later than September. Transfer and charter members do not count for credit. **In addition to the ribbon, qualifying clubs will also earn a special discount code for 10% off their next club order.** Discount code expires six months from date of issue and is not valid with any other offer.

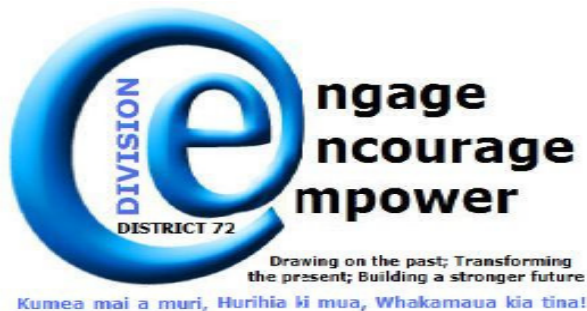
