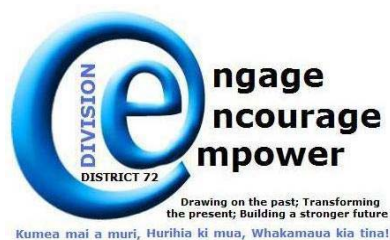

The significance of a vision

Like Dr King, it's important to:-

1. know and understand your mission which will transcend into your vision
2. link your vision with human aspects of your mission

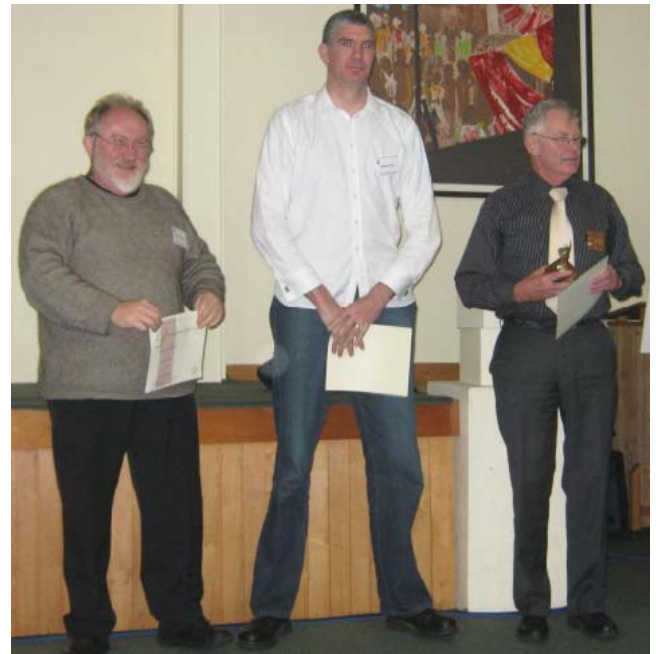

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Entering contests isn't so bad (part 2)

Last month's issue featured newcomer Toastmaster, Sandra Cumming, and her experiences of entering the Humorous contest. Now, prior to representing Division E as our reigning Division E Humorous contest winner, and in between his speech preparation time, a 'seasoned' contest participant gives us an honest and upbeat insight into his contest experiences. Fellow Toastmasters, I give you Rob Julian DTM, Ohariu and Capital Toastmasters.

Rob, why do you enter your club humorous contest? I always encourage members of both clubs, Ohariu and Capital to enter every contest. My view is that to be involved in the Toastmaster programme to give oneself confidence and skill at public speaking, and then not to enter a contest is like practising cricket at the nets and never playing a game.

As a first time contestant, were you well informed about what you were getting yourself into?

My first contest was the Div B Division Evaluation contest in Wellington in 1973. I was in the Palmerston North Toastmasters Club and we did not have a club contest - there was not time. Instead the club had a vote and since I had delivered my first general evaluation in which I took some of the older members to task for 'cruising' I was nominated to represent the Club. As it happens, I won but had no idea I was to go up to Auckland for the very first District Contest. In the Palmerston North club, we had a bell to signal time and I had not had experience of timing lights and couldn't locate them



until getting to the end of my evaluation (they were at the back of the room) and the red light was on. I finished promptly but was 5 seconds over time. And,

of course, 'everyone' said I was clearly the winner if only for sticking to the allocated time. I was so enraged with myself I was determined to win a District Evaluation Contest which I finally did at New Plymouth ten years later! Since then I have won the District Inter-national at the Silver Jubilee in 1987 with my Te Rauparaha speech (I went over to Perth to compete against the three Aussie Divisions but couldn't convince the Western Australians to identify with "Ka mate Ka mate"). And I have got 2nd and 3rd at subsequent Evaluations contest, come 3rd three times in the Humorous, and 2nd in the Impromptu when it was a 5/6/7 minute speech, and I have

not placed at two district contests. I sometimes wonder if I have been in more district finals than any other District 72 Toastmaster!

Talk us through your preparation for the contest?

For a speech it is a case of thinking up a topic. It must be:

- relevant to the audience
- contain some humour and/or be inspirational
- have a message



I run a lot and there is nothing else to do but think and I come up with most of my ideas when running.

And then you won, how did that feel?

Most times I feel surprised. There are odd times when I wonder how on earth the person who won was placed first by the judges. In order to win one must give

- the best speech at the time
- give a speech the judges think is the best speech

Your next challenge was then to compete at Area level, how did you prepare for that?

When winning at the club, the speech needs to be severely revised. A speech that wins at the club level will not necessarily be good enough to win at the Area level. Similarly for going on to the Division and then the District. I keep giving the speech again and again at the club level and running my own evaluation asking



members how different alternative bits work.

How has consistent competing in contests helped you as time has gone on?

One gets more focussed. A speech that wins one year will not even get place in succeeding years. Tastes change. At one time, only motivational speeches won. These days, every speech must have humour in it. (In fact one could cynically say we now have three humorous speech contests - the International, the Impromptu, and the Humorous Speech Contest).

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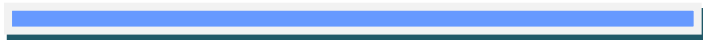
What have you learnt from your experience with entering contests? How to lose.

Will you continue to enter contests in the foreseeable future or try your hand at other opportunities connected with contests? When the Wellington Speaking Union had contests, I used to enter them. They no longer do.

For anyone thinking of entering their first -ever contest, what one key piece of advice? Enter. You can give one of your previous speeches. And give it without notes.

For anyone who has not fared too well at contests to date, what one key piece of advice would you like to share? Keep at it. You will eventually get there. Not too many people realise that there is more competition to win a District Contest than it is to become an All Black. You have to be the best out of some 3,000 Toastmasters. All you have to do to become an AB is be one of the 30 best out of about 1,000 senior rugby players

- answered every question given to him clearly and confidently
- used appropriate body gestures and eye contact

And the benefits for your club? As stated in former issues you stand to acquire:-

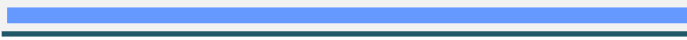
- additional new members with new ideas, new stories and so much more

You just never know....

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Taking the fear out of speechcrafts (part 2)

Last week you read about Toastmaster Erin Daldry's experience of doing her very first speechcraft. In this feature we learn from an experienced speechcraft facilitator and her experiences – Leanne Gibson, senior club member and VP Education Officer from Business Breakfast Club.

Leanne, how long have you been delivering speechcrafts? As a facilitator - four years.

How many speechcrafts in total have you delivered? Four for Shell Oil (now known as Z), one for the Securities Commission, one for the Ministry of Education and one for Boffa Miskell.

How many public or corporate courses have you delivered? They have all been corporate sessions which is in-sync with the brand of our own club "Business Breakfast".

Why do you believe in speechcrafts? They are a highly cost efficient and fun way to improve productivity in the work environment.

When do you decide to put on speechcrafts? When approached by a business (that has some affiliation to our club members).

Name three things you enjoy about delivering speechcrafts? Seeing attendees develop their speaking skills over a very short period of time, getting emails from attendees stating how much the 8-week course has changed their personal/working lives, getting repeat business.

Share with us your most memorable speechcraft experience and why? The day that one of the "quieter" attendees brought a huge wooden box into the meeting room and left it sitting there until his speech. You could tell that he was VERY excited and passionate about whatever was in the box. He opened it up SLOWLY.... and wouldn't you know it - out came the RANFURLY shield. It was an AWESOME speech and as a BONUS we all got to have our pictures taken holding it.

If someone was keen to put together their first ever speechcraft what five key "do or don't" tips would you give them?

1. DO: Start off by being a co-facilitator (if you can)
2. DO: Try and get as much help from other facilitators and access their templates and resources
3. DON'T: Underestimate the amount of work required to deliver a professional Speechcraft that does justice to the Toastmasters brand
4. DON'T: Accept people on the course unless they truly want to attend. (ie don't allow managers to just send people)
5. DO: Create agendas that have variety and fun as a basis.

Is there anything else you'd like to add? I think it would be very valuable to have a Speechcraft facilitator's forum soon so we can swap tips/tricks about how to run successful Speechcrafts that get repeat business and enhance the Toastmaster brand.

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Quiz Time



Did you know.....that **the role of quizmaster** is to run a pub quiz for up to 10-12 teams? It involves presenting questions and answers, marking answer sheets and tallying and broadcasting scores, then awarding prizes. All that, and with PERSONALITY.

KIWIZ Trivia nights are run weekly in nine pubs in the Wellington Area with Andrew Taylor and Tanya Fletcher (QUIZIT Entertainment) hosting two of them personally. Andrew presents the quiz and Tanya marks the questions and tallies the scores. They currently provide weekly Quiz Kits to 20-40 venues around New Zealand.

QUIZIT Entertainment is looking for quizmasters in Wellington and beyond. They've heard of Toastmasters and would like to develop a relationship with us with a view to being able to put their quiz into pubs around the country along with a prospective quizmaster.

If you think you have personality, enjoy creating a fun environment, feel confident that you can set the tone of a quiz evening, and have a clear speaking voice then this may be your calling. Andrew says that you can run a quiz evening by yourself if you wish, or you can pair up with someone, as he does with Tanya. You could also alternate with another quizmaster or be a back-up.



The quiz season tends to be during the darker hours of daylight saving, with Tuesday and Wednesday being the most popular nights. Thursdays feature too but Fridays-Mondays are rare. The season can be longer if the pub and the punters are willing. QUIZIT Entertainment is looking for people who can commit for at least a season.

Andrew and Tanya started running their own quizzes after competing in the Black Harp quiz in Wellington eight years ago. In fact, it's where they met – as members of opposing teams! Tanya is an Office Manager during the day and Andrew has given up his IT career to run QUIZIT Entertainment full-time. Andrew says that he has gone from

being a tongue-tied presenter to a professional. It took him about three months to settle into the role.

If you are interested, QUIZIT Entertainment offers Andrew as a coach along with YouTube videos of quizzes and a pamphlet on how to run them. QUIZIT Entertainment provides all the questions, answers, answer sheets and ancillary paperwork necessary to run their pub quiz. Andrew would introduce prospective quizmasters to an interested pub and let the pub know what's expected in terms of remuneration. This can range from \$100-\$150 cash and may include some drinks, depending on the pub.



So what's in it for the quizmaster? Andrew says it's a great ego-booster! QUIZIT Entertainment provides you with the questions, answers and extraneous information for answering queries. No electronics are needed; however, having a spreadsheet to add up the scores for you could be useful to keep the quiz running to time. Along with the monetary recompense, it's a great way to increase your own general knowledge and tuck away some interesting facts with which to astound your friends.

The organisers best piece of advice? Remember that a quiz is a fun night, not a school exam. It's about entertainment that fits the punters.

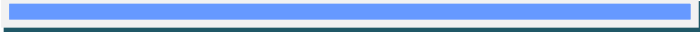
How have these skills benefited you personally and professionally? I have given presentations for customers and for professional organisations on my field in the Service sector of ICT.

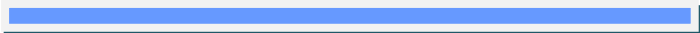
What is your favourite thing about Toastmasters? I enjoy the people and the skills that I discover I have, or find I have developed over the years.

What surprised you most about Toastmasters? That at each level up it becomes more challenging and there are many new skills to be learnt.

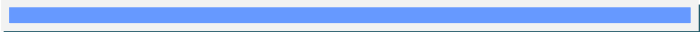

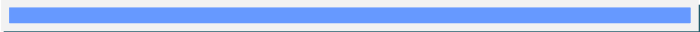

The team of Toast Health Toastmasters during their official charter ceremony taken at SOI café and restaurant, Evans Bay.

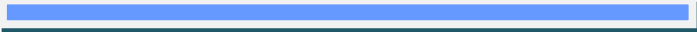

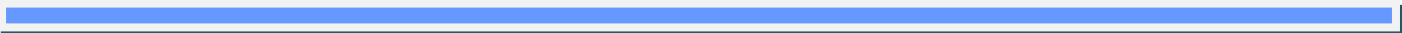
