### Speechcraft Courses

The Speechcraft programme blends in-person learning with online self-study. It allows experienced Toastmasters to help non-members build their communication skills. Speechcraft programmes can be run as community programmes or for a corporate organisation. Coordinators of community Speechcraft programmes have to find their own venue and recruit the participants from within their local community. When the programme is run for a business, the business will usually supply the venue and recruit the participants.

Speechcraft programmes can be used as a club fundraiser or to raise awareness of Toastmasters. Speechcraft coordinators can earn credit towards the Distinguished Toastmaster (DTM) award.

## 100 Years



The founder of Toastmasters, Ralph C. Smedley, organised the first unofficial Toastmasters meeting in Bloomington, Illinois on 24 March 1905. However, Smedley, who worked for the YMCA, moved frequently and the club did not flourish.

By 1924, Smedley had moved to California. The first official Toastmasters meeting was held on 22 October 1924 at the YMCA in Santa Ana, California. There are currently over 14,000 clubs in 148 countries.



# **Recognise Achievements**

Celebrating members' success How are you recognising the achievements of members in your club? Is there more you could do? Recognition is not just about giving awards. It's about creating an environment where everyone feels valued and appreciated. This is key to the success of any Toastmasters club. When you recognise the contribution your members make to your club it helps to show appreciation for the value they bring. It can also provide motivation for your members to continue to improve their skills and take on new challenges. Recognition can help in retaining members. When members feel appreciated and see their efforts being recognised, they are more likely to stay engaged and committed to the club. Recognition helps in building a strong community within the club. It fosters a sense of belonging and camaraderie among members. Recognition also plays a crucial role in leadership development. It allows members to see the impact of their leadership and inspires others to step up and take on leadership roles.

Achievements – These are for members that have worked towards completing projects. (Certificates can be printed out for each level completion).

- DTM (Distinguished Toastmaster)

- **Best Evaluator**
- **Outstanding Toastmaster**
