

Clubs will have their own Annual Business Meetings in the 1st meeting in May. This is where you elect your Club Officers for 2024 - 2025.



District 72 Alignment 2024-25



Location of clubs on Area C6. The driving distance from Timaru to Westport 450 km via Arthur's Pass with a driving time of 6 hours.

The Toastmasters
International Board of
Directors has decided that,
from the 2024-25 contest
cycle, Area, Division and
District Contests will be inperson. For more information
see the text of the email sent
to District Directors,
Program Quality Directors
and Club Growth Directors on
31 January 2024. This
decision means that the
current Area C6 will not be
viable.

Area C6 consists of five clubs: Alpine Toastmasters (Timaru), Ashburton, Greymouth and Westport, shown on the map, plus on online club, Everest. The proposed alignment from 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025 is for Timaru and Ashburton to return to Area D5 (southern Christchurch) and for Greymouth and Westport to join Area D6 (Nelson, Nelson Madhatters, Motueka and Blenheim). Everest will remain in Area C6 to be joined by other online clubs to become an online Area. Details of the proposed alignment are in the District Realignment Report, which will be presented to the District Council Meeting on 4 May.

Jack Duffy Award and Conference Bids for 2025

1 – Reminder for nominations for the Jack Duffy award

Nominations are now open for the *Jack Duffy Memorial* Rosebowl *for Community Service* - this is for the most outstanding contribution to the community, and/or community activity or activities raising the profile of Toastmasters by a Toastmasters Club.

Criteria:

While the number of times a specific activity occurs is important, so is a range of different community-based activities. Types of activity which may meet the criteria include (but are not limited to):

- •Club presents a Youth Leadership programme.
- •Club presents a Speechcraft course.
- •A club member talks about Toastmasters either on TV or Radio.
- •Members judge a school speech contest, or school debate contest.
- •A member presents a speech to a non-Toastmasters audience and Toastmasters is highlighted either by the speaker, or when they are being introduced.
- •An outside event e.g.: running a Local communication award, participating or chairing a public friendly debate, say with a Rotary club, or a speaking engagement/activity as part of a local festival.

NOTE: Any of the activities listed above and any additional activities need to be supported with documentation, photos etc showing the club has carried out the activity.

Questions to ask yourself when submitting your application:

- 1. How has your club promoted Toastmasters in the community?
- 2. What community events has your club been involved in?
- 3. How has your club benefited your community?

The award will be presented at the District 72 Conference in May.

Lessons Learned from Kura Kōrero – Chartering a new club

1. It takes longer than you think it will

From idea to chartering took almost 8 months. We had high hopes it was all going to happen very quickly, but it took longer than we thought – though apparently not longer than the average. Getting the last 4 members took the longest.

2. Be careful what you agree to while drinking.

Kura Kōrero was conceived during an end of Toastmaster year celebration at Dillengers Brasserie and Bar in Wellington. Several of our charter members were at that celebration who were convinced that they needed to join this new (e.g. 5 minutes old) club. There may have been cocktails involved.

3. People are people, set your expectations accordingly.

Some people who say, "I'm definitely in!" will not be in. Be proactive but not pushy – some will be a be a slow burn but will come through in the end. People need their own time to make a decision about what works best for them. We aimed for people who were passionate about the idea of the club and wanted to be members. We didn't want to sign up people who were just doing it to be supportive. That means we can fill our roles each week and at our first dues round 19 of the charter members are staying.

4. Find your niche

Offer something different than other clubs. Meet a need. We created a club that I would have joined if it already existed. Karakia, whakatauki, Ako learning sessions- these are all chances for our members to practice skills they might not get in another Toastmasters club. We also discovered a secondary purpose - tech skills in an online environment. #Pro tip - accidently removing someone from a meeting (instead of removing the spotlight) makes it very hard for them to log back in unless you have changed your default zoom settings! Sorry Debs!

5. Adapt to the needs of your members

Ultimately it is members who shape the values and the culture of the club. Listen to them. We made changes along the way to get the best from our time together. This included deciding on our values as a club – and a new start time.

So now you too can join Kura Kōrero weekly on Thursday nights at 6pm.
